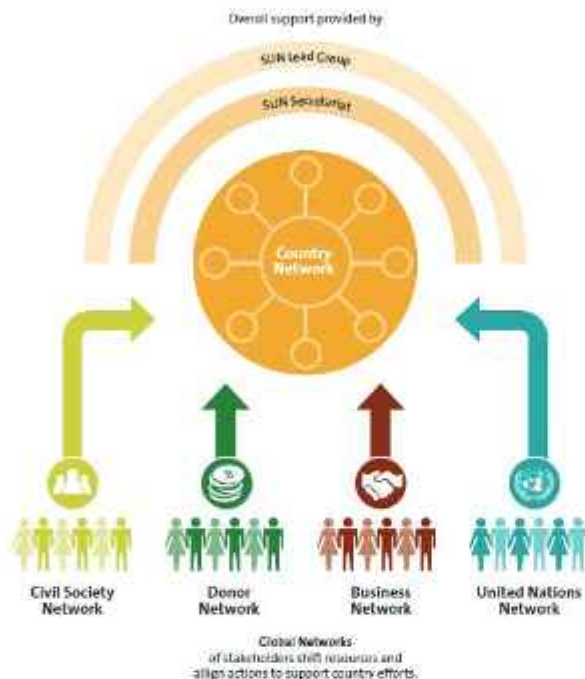

## 1. ENGAGEMENT OF SUN CIVIL SOCIETY NETWORK IN SRI LANKA TO IMPROVE FOOD AND NUTRITION SECURITY

This UNICEF funded project was an effort to implement recommendations from SUN PF's 2016 National Nutrition Policy Review, in particular aimed to the improve the civil society capacity on nutrition and food security at the district level.

There were two main focus areas;

1. Supported to improve the knowledge of the Out-of-School Adolescents and Youth on food groups & importance of good nutrition for their growth and development Under this area conducted FGDs with above target groups to identify gaps in knowledge on basic nutrition and food groups in Puttlam and Nuwara Eliya (4 FGDs - 2 in each district). This was supported in the development of the nutrition awareness / education programmes targeting Out-of-School Adolescents and Youth as well as to develop awareness and education materials. And thereafter conducted two trainings (in Puttlam and Nuwara Eliya districts) (40 participants each training) which supported them to enhanced their knowledge on the nutritious diet intake and their nutrition requirements. In addition they would be the change agents who share the nutrition messages with the peers at the community level.



2. Established Scaling Up Nutrition Civil Society Networks in 2 districts and developed their capacity to improve nutrition and food security

Trained local civil society members on nutrition and nutrition interventions (2 training programmes in Puttlam and Nuwara Eliya (1 per district), 25 civil society organizations each). It's an important factor the improvement of the nutrition knowledge of the civil society leaders in the areas as they are the key people to share the messages and to support the nutrition related activities in the field. These training programs helped them to understand the nutrition needs in the community and to link them with the food security interventions. In addition this was an opportunity to link the CSOs to the SUN PF network.



## 2. SCALING UP NUTRITION CIVIL SOCIETY GATHERING

The advocacy event to mark the Nutrition Month took place at the Hector Kobbekaduwa Agrarian Research and Training Institute on 30th June 2017. The gathering was attended by nearly 160 civil society representatives from Colombo, Mannar, Jaffna, Mathale, Hambanthota, Killinochchi, Vavuniya and Anuradhapura districts.

The objective of this program is to share the nutrition month's theme, update them on current nutrition situation in the country and to discuss and plan with them the nutrition programs in the respective areas.

The event marked the launch of the Civil Society Findings of the National Nutrition Policy Implementation Review Report and the Advocacy Plan for the civil society



Key note speakers including Dr Dula de Silva, former CEO at SUN PF and WFP's deputy Country Director, Mr. Nguyenduc Hoang emphasized the important role the civil society can play in improving nutrition and food security.

The event also provided the civil society members a platform to communicate to the audience the best practices and the nutrition uplifting activities conducted in their respective divisions

Various speakers from the different sectors, academia and institutions did lectures on topics such as Overview of Country Nutrition Situation, Behavior Change Promotion ( Practical aspects) and Food and Myths.



### 3. MEMBERSHIP CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Mathale and Hambantota districts were the beneficiaries of the 2017 membership capacity building programme. Objective was to enhance the civil society organizations or the members capacity to involve in the nutrition promotion activities at the community level.

97 Civil Society members representing from various community level organization who are recognized as key advocates and mobilizers in uplifting district nutrition status, were educated and trained on the First 1000 days of Nutrition and Dietary Diversity. The programme focused to motivate the civil society to organize the nutrition promotion activities at community level while improving the nutritional knowledge of these civil society members. Emphasis was placed on the importance of self-practicing good nutrition and dietary habits to carry forward the message and to be game-changers.



The training day entailed group activities and discussions which provided a useful platform to share best practices. The evaluation of the programme was processed through a pre and post assignment which generated a positive impact with the higher mean post-test scores in both districts.

Sustainability of training was promoted with the programme encouraging the participants to prepare their own action plan to conduct nutrition enhancing programmes in their area.



#### 4. SUN GLOBAL GATHERING

In November 2017, nearly 1000 members representing SUN countries gathered in Côte d'Ivoire to share their inspirational progression and encourage global collaboration in the fight against malnutrition. Seen as the flagship event of the SUN Movement, it is an important moment where members take stock of progress and challenges, share their innovations and learn what is helping to reduce malnutrition across all SUN Countries. It is a moment for every actor to be energized and encouraged through sharing, learning and finding ways to take their fight against malnutrition to the next level.

The objectives of the 2017 SUN Movement Global Gathering reflected the spirit and ambitions of the second phase of the SUN Movement, as set out in its Strategy and Roadmap for 2016-2020. The primary goals of the 2017 Global Gathering were to:

- ❑ Celebrate SUN Countries' progress in advancing implementation of national nutrition plans, better understand challenges, and, collectively, identify solutions.
- ❑ Create a space where SUN Countries and the SUN Movement support system can interact and get to know each other better in order to sharpen skills, deepen understanding of key issues and agree on priority actions to ensure we are on track to deliver results.
- ❑ Showcase the wealth of experience, knowledge and resources that each SUN Country has to offer, whilst strengthening our networks to best capitalize on these assets.

Delegation of Seven from the Sri Lanka, including SUN Focal Person from the National Nutrition Secretariat under the Presidents' Secretariat, Chairperson of the SUN PF SL, One SUN PF Council member, WFP, UNICEF and One government district focal person represented Sri Lanka at the Global Gathering.

The Sri Lankan stall which was at the market place showcased SUN activities and the state interventions on improving the nutritional status of the country.

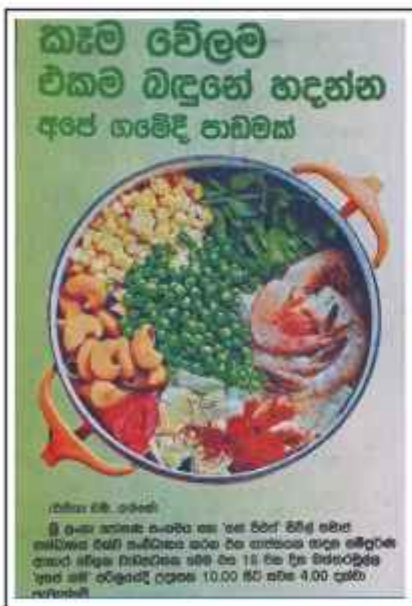


## 5. ONE DISH MEAL PROGRAMME

The One Dish Meal campaign commenced on December 2017 in Apegama , Baththaramulla which featured civil society organizations and the general public. There were 76 members participated from the various CSOs around the country. And this was targeted the media personnel's too. The key objective of the campaign is to popularize one dish meals as the answer to household food insecurity and malnutrition.

A balance diet prepared in one dish will cost less time and money is the message to be passed around! The workshop's educational content was extracted directly from the Food Based Dietary Guidelines. This will help to address the issue of malnutrition and also contribute to the household level awareness of balance and diverse diet intake.

A group of resource persons from the Agriculture Department conducted the demonstrations explaining clearly the importance of managing the cost, time and the nutrition balance of the diet. The event entailed a one dish meal competition followed by prizes for the best recipes. The programme was a joint collaboration of Nutrition Society of Sri Lanka and SUN PF which was sponsored by WFP and Diamond Foods and supported by Word Vision Lanka and Child Fund.



## CIVIL SOCIETY MEMBERS FEEDBACK

I participated for three programmes conducted by the SUN PF during last year. They are; CSO Gathering targeting the nutrition month, District level CSO capacity building programme and the "One dish meal" programme held in Apegama, Baththaramulla. As a participant for me all these programmes provided a good support to work with the children less than five years of age in the areas.

As community workers the problem we had was, we were giving them the awareness but not the practical ways of doing them. However, when I participated to these three programmes I received a successful answer for that.

If I give an example, We are working with the people who earn less income, so targeting them, we were given a good knowledge on how to prepare a balance meal within less time, using available food resources in the village. They shared us how to prepare various food we didn't know to prepare. And it's important for those who are leading a very busy life to prepare a food within a short time period resulting a balanced diet.

Similarly all the three programmes provided knowledge in a new way and I can say they are very successful programmes.

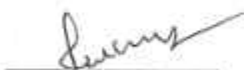

## 2018 & BEYOND

- SUN PF closed 2017 on a high with the council expressing their satisfaction with the progress achieved during the year.
- Action plans were drawn to integrate further with the government, to ensure deeper collaboration of the civil society at policy design and formulation.
- Implementing research findings is a key to realizing nutrition enhancement targets; accordingly investments are ongoing to ensure the implementation of the policy review findings.
- SUN PF has selected four thematic areas aligning to Global Civil Society Network to work in the year 2018. Those areas are; 1. Monitoring and Enforcement of National Codes on Breast Milk Substitutes , 2. Public hearings, 3. Coordinated campaigns during regional/global events e.g. GNR; breastfeeding week 4. Multi-stakeholder/multi sector collaboration
- While important plans are underway, 2018 also pose as a challenging year. Lack of sustained funding is an on-going barrier to implementing sustainable programmes.
- A crucial target for 2018 is to integrate with the private sector to secure funding while using them as a medium of information communication and awareness.
